LIMPOPO HEALTH MEC DR PHOPHI RAMATHUBA URGES PEOPLE TO REMAIN ON

ALERT AS THE PROVINCE EXPERIENCE THE RESURGENCE OF MALARIA CASES

Limpopo Health MEC Dr Phophi Ramathuba has call upon Limpopo citizens to remain alert as

the province experience resurgence of malaria cases. Since the beginning of Malaria season, the

province has so far recorded 406 malaria cases with 2 unfortunate deaths. Even though is still

lower than last financial year, it still remains a cause for concern because it's a clear indication

that we have not yet achieved our ambition of Zero Malaria infection.

Some parts of Limpopo Province are known Malaria endemic area, and as such the Department

has put in place 42 malaria teams to strategic places throughout the province to control the

desease towards the ultimate elimination of malaria. The Department has just launched and

dispatched the malaria control team on a door to door campaign to test and treat as well as

distributing flyers on malaria as a way to step up the fight against malaria. Vhembe and Mopani

District are the most affected districts when it comes to malaria cases with Sekhukhune District

following suit to be a malaria hot-spot.

The Department has over the past 15 years made considerable progress in reducing the

evidence of malaria in the province. In 2020/2021, 3461 malaria cases and 19 deaths were

recorded.

During the current 2021/2022, 406 malaria cases have been reported, with 2 unfortunate deaths

in the province. The District breakdown of Malaria cases and deaths are as follows: Vhembe

District, 196 cases and 1 death case, Mopani District, 184 cases and 1 death case, Waterberg

District, 10 cases no death, Capricorn District, 10 cases, no death, and Sekhukhune District, 6

cases, no death. These deaths are as a result of a delay in patients seeking health care,

presenting with complicated symptoms.

"As we approach the rainy season, we continue to urge all malaria prone communities to stay

vigilant and immediately report any malaria related case to the nearest clinic or Primary Health

Centre. We have so far trained surveillance teams consisting of Environmental Health

Practitioners (EHS) and spray operators who will be on the ground testing and treating malaria

to increase the malaria programmer's ability to reach most malaria infected individuals and

significantly decrease the malaria parasite reservoir in Limpopo. While the incidence of malaria

has declined to lower levels, malaria remains a fatal disease if remained undiagnosed and

untreated.

Malaria is preventable, Malaria is curable and Malaria kills. Let's make malaria fight our

responsibility. Zero Malaria infection starts with me" said MEC Ramathuba.
